FACTS

Spotted eagle rays can be found from the surface to just over 196 feet (60 m) deep.

They are commonly observed leaping out of the water. Scientists speculate that leaping rays may be females trying to avoid unwanted male attention, or they may do it to shake off parasites or remoras.



Characterized by a dark dorsal surface and white spots or rings.

Endangered due to bycatch and small litter size.

SIZE Can reach a length of 2.3 m (7.5 ft)

RANGE Tropical regions, including the Atlantic, Pacific, and Indian Oceans.
