


Sharks of The Bahamas

These sharks (Harley Quinn, Joker, Enyo, and Gaia, along with other Tiger sharks and Great Hammerheads) can be seen off the coast of Bimini in the winter months. There are over 40 different species of sharks found throughout The Bahamas. They are incredibly diverse and range in size. They are also found in different habitats and depths, including mangroves, coral reefs, seagrass beds and the deep ocean! The Bahamas established its Shark Sanctuary in 2011, making it illegal to catch and kill sharks. The Bahamas is also considered the shark diving capital of the world. Shark tourism (people coming to see and dive with sharks) generates \$113.8 million USD annually for the economy. Sharks are worth more alive than dead!

Start with coloring the dorsal fin. To ensure your fin doesn't fall to the side you can glue this sheet to cardboard or thick paper. This will keep your fin strong!

Next, cut along the dashed lines to the edge of the paper. Fold along the solid gray line (where it says 'fold here'). Use a hole-punch or scissors to make four holes in the lower section as shown in the diagrams.

> Use two pieces of string or yarn for the "straps" (you can measure out the length you need before putting on the fin).

Pull the string through the holes (refer to diagrams above). Hold the top string as you place the fin on your back. Tie the upper and lower strings together. You can tie them together before wearing the fin (imagine creating backpack straps), but it will fit better if you tie the strings while the fin is on your back.

Now, you're a shark!

Sharks are "keystone species" - they help maintain the health of our oceans. Sharks are extremely important. It's time to get creative and become a shark!


